April Meeting Review, In-Fisherman's Matt Straw

Matt Straw entertained the FM Walleye's crowd on tips to improve the success rate for catching walleyes. Matt began his presentation by saying "Get the live bait out of your boat. It is expensive, stinks, and is generally messy". A good portion of his presentation dealt with the use of plastic baits for catching walleyes. Matt covered about as much information in an hour and a half as can be covered. For the sake of simplicity, I will summarize his presentation with bullet points.

• Fish shallow. Shallow water walleyes are the least pressured fish in the lake. Walleyes, or some significant portion of a lake's population, will remain shallow all summer long. Weeds hold walleyes, especially when the wind blows! Fish in the weed pockets...all summer long!

• When exploring a new body of water, divide the lake into sections (lake within a lake). What is the forage base? Is it perch (most are)? If so, many walleyes will be found shallow. Is the forage base cisco? If so, try fishing suspended over deep water as spring moves into summer.

• Fishing rivers? Try a whistler jig tipped with a plastic body. Seems to work better than a ball head jig.

• Use plastic swim baits or plastic grubs. Matt mentioned several anglers' he knows that won't even use live bait through the ice. If they'll bite plastic in the winter, the odds are fairly good that they will in the summer too.

• The best plastic type to use is the salted type. Salt impregnated plastic is more buoyant and will sink more slowly, allowing the bait to be fished slower. Scented baits are also a good bet though he is more concerned with the action of the bait than the smell. Many of the new plastic worms have great action compared to years past.

• Don't fish plastics like bait. Jigging action is not necessary. Simply cast out into the weed bed (or edge) and reel the plastic back in. Keep the plastic moving!

• Use small, 1/8 oz ball jig heads with shad type swim baits or grubs. Make sure you have at least a 1/0 or 2/0 hook as the plastic can take up quite a bit of hooking space. Use light colored plastic in dark water, natural colors in clear water.

• Crankbaits can be productive all summer long (even early spring). Long minnow bait types seem to produce a bit more than shad baits early in the season. Examples include Deep Thunderstick Jr., Deep Little Rippers, and Dave's Kaboom lures.

- Crankbaits will usually produce larger fish. Plastic swim baits and plastic grubs will also produce larger fish a lot of the time.
- When does Matt go back to live bait rigs? When fishing under a bobber and immediately after a cold front. All other times are plastic only!

Matt also touched on the art of crappie fishing. Crappies will be feeding in areas where zooplankton can be found. 1/80th -1/200th oz jigs made by numerous companies are your best bet for crappies. Don't forget about the Maribou jig. A staple from years past that will still produce crappies. How about crankbaits? Matt has caught many crappie on small crankbaits. Crappies suspending 5-10' under the surface can be targeted with small crankbaits (1-1.5" long minnow type baits).

As mentioned earlier, Matt covered a large amount of information in a short amount of time. If one were to take away two things from the presentation they would be:

Fish shallow and give plastic baits (minnow baits, grubs, or crankbaits) a try!




Leech Lake Club Outing - May 22-23

Fishing Personalities by Jack Fuller

"Early Spring Fishing"

I have deviated from my usual format this month for a couple of reasons. One my next interviewee is better suited for June or July and a recent fishing trip provided both excellent fishing, but also had its down side. It disturbed me enough to put it to "pen".

On April 21 and 22, my wife Jan, brother-in-law Mic, and I hit the waters of Devils Lake in search of a few Walleye. Each year about this time we are breaking a little ice to get to our "honey hole". It has always been an adventure to say the least but worth the effort because we usually are rewarded with some very nice Walleyes. Our philosophy has been, take the "eaters" and release the larger fish, the females which are ready to spawn. Our "spot" was barren this year, so we proceeded to inquire where the Walleyes may be. All signs pointed to Channel A. This was our first time fishing in this area. As many of you are aware I'm sure, this is where large fish congregate to feed and fatten up before the spawn. Fishing was super; we felt we had hit the "mother load". After two days of fishing, the three of us caught and released approximately 35 Walleyes between 4 and 8 lbs. and 50 Northern 4 to 13 lbs. It was actually hard to find the eating size males. We did manage to land fifteen 16-19 inch male Walleyes in that period of time however. Of coarse we were not the only ones catching large fish. Oh no! The shoreline and railroad tracks were lined with fishermen as well as 6 or 8 boats in the channel. All were catching large fish.

Here lies the problem or at least in my perspective. Being in close proximity to all of this made it easy to observe that these large fish were not being released but likely going to the frying pan. I was taught that these large females are the egg layers for future class years and that catching and releasing these fish is ecologically prudent for the success of the fishery. We try to encourage and promote this philosophy by teaching our young people to be good stewards of the lakes and waterways. Therefore this disturbed me enough to e-mail N.D. Game and Fish. With the following:

Last week (Thursday and Friday) our party fished Devils Lake in the Channel "A" area. We caught and released many large Walleye and Northern. A problem I noticed is that the channel which was full of boats and many fishing from shore, were not releasing these large female fish ready to spawn. Restrictions should be placed on this area in the spring such as:

1. Size and/or weight limit. • 2. Catch and release only. • 3. No fishing in the channel before a certain date. After the fish have moved out and completed their spawn.

The taking of these large female Northern and Walleye has to have a detrimental effect on the quality of the Devils Lake fishery. Does the N.D. Game and Fish Dept. have a position on this issue? Randy Hiltner, N.D. Game and Fish responded with this: Jack.

I have been forwarded your email concerning the spring fishing at Channel A. Your observations of high fishing effort and foulhooking of pike and walleye are what we've also seen the past two weeks. Fortunately, this spring we have a creel clerk getting us the quantitative data on everything from: fishing effort; harvest; release rates; foul-hooking vs. caught in the mouth, etc. After reviewing this data, we will likely see the fish harvest is not having a significant negative effect on the fish populations but some anglers are bending fishing ethics as these are "fish in a barrel" during high flow years. We have more than enough walleye eggs in the lake to produce a strong hatch, so keeping some big females in April is just as ethical as during June (although I have no idea why someone wants to keep a big fish unless it is for a mount). Again, we will evaluate the information on this spring run at Channel A later this year and discuss the situation to see if it warrants some kind of a closure.

I have since heard from other anglers that catch and release in these areas has been treated rather lightly by our enforcement and administrative agencies (Game and Fish). I have no hard evidence of this but certainly hope this is not the case. I would welcome any response to this issue with your opinions. My e-mail address is jackfuller@i29.net.

Just a note to hunters and fishermen planning to stay in Devils Lake. On this trip the three of us booked in at Mike and Sarah's "B.S. Shack", (I think the B.S. must stand for beautiful sunshine). The "Shack", as they call it has some first class accommodations. First off, it is a single story house in Devils Lake that they have completely redone to meet the needs of the sportsman. Here is what we found:

- 1. The house was recently remodeled and painted inside and out.
- 2. All new fixtures including shower, stool, sink, etc. were added in the bathroom. New towels and wash cloths are provided and laundered.
- 3. Washer/dryer and vacuum.
- 4. The Kitchen contains all appliances and utensils.
- 5. Two cable TV, systems.
- 6. A living room with recliner and queen size hide-a-bed.
- 7. Telephone.
- 8. Two bedrooms with both bunk beds and standard size beds. By using the hide-a-bed in the living room, 7-8 people could sleep comfortably.
- 9. The entire house is set in an outdoor decor, very tastefully done.
- 10. In the back there is room to park two vehicle/boat units.
- 11. For the hunters there is an outdoor dog kennel and plans for a fish cleaning station (although there is plenty of room to clean fish indoors).

Angler's Night Review – Sam Anderson

Walleye pro Sam Anderson provided education and entertainment for the FM Walleyes audience at the annual Angler's Night at Playmakers Pavilion on March 18. Sam learned how to fish Mille Lacs Lake in central Minnesota and began guiding at the age of 14. Sam started his professional career at the age of 18 years old. Sam discussed tackling a new body of water and gave some specifics on techniques.

Search technique – important when tackling a new body of water. Use crankbaits or bottom bouncers to search new areas. These tactics allow you to cover water quickly, eliminating unproductive water and hopefully, leading you to fish. Try to duplicate the pattern after catching a few fish. Once a pattern develops, fine-tune the presentation and start catching fish.

Tools that can help you catch fish:

Drift sock – helps stabilize the boat in windy conditions.

Planer boards - fish are often shallower than you think. Use boards in these situations.

Netting a fish – always let your partner know right away that you have a fish on the line so that he can get ready. Net the fish head first, not tail first. Don't jab at the fish, especially if it is hooked with a crankbait. Simply net the fish with a scooping motion.

Scents – Sam is a believer in scents. Also, consider using a no-scent soap.

PowerBait - catch rate is higher than no-scent baits.

- Trolling use long, soft tip rods. The rods do not have to be expensive. Leadcore is his favorite line to use while trolling. Leadcore is the only line that is speed sensitive. The faster you go, the higher in the water column the bait will run. If you plan to make a lot of turns while trolling, a superbraid such as Fireline is the best choice.
- Bottom bouncers Sam carries 3 sizes 3/4, 1-1/2, and 2 oz. Use a 3-4' leader, beads, a spinner and two hooks. Add a treble hook as the last hook to increase hooking percentage (not legal in all states). Sam uses copper, gold, silver, or firetiger patterns on the blades.

Jigging – Sam uses high vis line 95% of the time. You can see strikes more easily if you can see the line.

Sam ended his presentation by answering questions from the audience. In Sam's words, "Always keep a smile on your face, be friendly at the ramp, and get kids involved in the sport of fishing".


